

94.3 per cent of injured workers in Rockhampton (R) returned to some form of employment (three year average). For Queensland overall, 94 per cent of injured workers returned to work.

Injured workers in Rockhampton (R) were off work for 48.7 days per claim on average, compared to the Queensland average of 45 days per claim.

Workers' compensation claims by workers in high risk industries

Health care and social assistance had the highest number of claims per year – 172 claims on average over the three years 2014-15 to 2016-17. Construction had the second highest number of claims per year – 120 claims on average over the three years.

The highest claim rates were recorded for workers in the agriculture, forestry and fishing industry (94.9 claims per 1,000 workers), followed by construction (60.4 claims per 1,000 workers). The industries with the highest average statutory costs per claim were agriculture, forestry and fishing (\$23,224) and construction (\$20,093).


