Electrical Safety Office Electrical safety performance report

Q2 2022-23

This report details Queensland's electrical safety performance for the period 1 October 2022 to 31 December 2022 as related to measures within the Electrical Safety Plan for Queensland 2018–22.



Electrical fatalities

• Two electrical fatalities reported during Q2.

Note: electrical fatalities reported remain suspected and under investigation until verified.

Month of incident	Details
November	During construction of a concrete wastewater tank, a worker (contractor) was in the basket of a boom lift EWP that contacted high voltage power lines. The worker sustained an electric shock, serious burns and has passed away.
December	Homeowner received a fatal electric shock while attempting to change a power point in the backyard.



Serious electrical incidents (SEI)

Three incidents were reported as SEIs under the Electrical Safety Act 2002 (ES Act) definition during Q2. This includes the two reported electrical fatalities listed above. The other SEI is:

Month of incident	Details
October	An electrical worker received burns after an arc flash while working on an energised distribution board.

Audit activity includes:



- 119 electrical contractor audits (systems and site verification)
- 76 responsible supplier audits
- 76 new electrical equipment audits
- 72 ceiling space audits
- 60 construction site audits (wiring, exclusion zones and principal contractor processes)
- 54 on-site licence checks
- 291 other various audits.

Engagement activity



- ESO undertook engagement activities with more than:
 - 111 organisations
 - 2,763 people.

Licensing committee activity



During Q2, there were nine licensing referrals to the Electrical Licensing Committee (ELC) for consideration of disciplinary action because of unsafe electrical work and non-compliant practices.

The nine referrals were made up of five electrical contractors and four electrical workers, with referrals relating to:

- electric shock (seven)
- young workers and electrical apprentices (one)
- repeat offenders (one).

Investigation activity

- Q.
- Three investigations finalised — One matter referred to State-wide
- Investigations unit (SWI) for further comprehensive investigation
- two matters with no further action required.
- six active investigations.

Check testing activity



Testing is in progress for the following electrical equipment

- 10 models of refrigerators
- 25 models of electrical portable outlet devices (EPODs)
- 10 models of nightlights

Prosecution activity



- No prosecutions finalised
- Currently six matters before the courts
- Two briefs of evidence currently under review by the Office of Work Health and Safety Prosecutor (OWHSP)

Licensing and registration activity



- 1,434 new electrical licences issued:
- 1,126 work licences
- 308 contractor licences.

Equipment activity



- 12 electrical equipment examinations were conducted
- four electrical safety equipment recalls were notified to the ESO.

Definitions (notices and other notices or requirements)

Improvement notice – a requirement, for the person to whom it is issued, to remedy a contravention of the Act or Regulations

Infringement notice - on the spot fine issued where an infringeable offence has been committed

Electrical safety protection notice – a direction for a person to stop an activity, or use of electrical equipment causing, or likely to cause, an immediate electrical risk to a person or property.

Unsafe equipment notice - issued if an inspector reasonably believes that electrical equipment is so defective or hazardous that it is likely to cause a serious electrical incident. This notice requires the owner to make the electrical equipment harmless or incapable of operation

Immediate compliance – a record of contraventions immediately rectified while inspectors are on site

Notice (s.74 Electrical Safety Regulation) – written notice given to the person in control of electrical equipment of any defect affecting the electrical safety of the electrical equipment
