

93.3 per cent of injured workers in Gympie returned to some form of employment (three year average). For Queensland overall, 94 per cent of injured workers returned to work.

Injured workers in Gympie were off work for 54.4 days per claim on average, compared to the Queensland average of 45 days per claim.

Workers' compensation claims by workers in high risk industries

The manufacturing industry had the highest number of claims per year - 113 claims on average over the three years 2014-15 to 2016-17. Health care and social assistance had the second highest number of claims per year – 44 claims on average over the three years.

The highest claim rates were recorded for workers in the manufacturing industry (84 claims per 1,000 workers), followed by wholesales trade (44.3 claims per 1,000 workers). The industries with the highest average statutory costs per claim were the transport, postal and warehousing industry (\$20,479) and construction (\$15,133).


